SEO REPORT

March brought us two items of interest, our new 8 week Boating Course and news of the new revised Piloting and Advanced Piloting courses coming out this fall.

We were pleasantly surprised at the good turnout with forty men, women and teenagers registering for the Boating Course. Steve Winter, P brought 3 large models of SeaRay cruisers for display and also did the first hour lecture. Pete Schmidt,P our course chairman doctored the CD we obtained from National combining the Anna Maria Island CD and other views to make a powerful Power Point presentation. Ed Kydd, SN and John Lynn, P taught Marlinspike. With proctors at each table, the evening went quickly and the students seemed thoroughly satisfied. I believe CBPS did well and we will report the final results in the next issue.

I was fortunate enough to obtain an outline of the new Piloting course while at the District 23 conference. As an aside, more of our members should attend these conferences as there is a lot of information presented and we get to meet members of other squadrons. The interaction usually provides a warm feeling that we are doing it right. The new course is a 10 week course, 8 in class and two separate weeks doing plotting exercises. The first four chapters covers an introduction to navigation, tools of piloting, plotting & planning techniques, and a chapter called On the Water which covers all the elements a skipper does while underway. Chapter 5 introduces GPS navigation, ie, how to use a GPS. Chapter 6 demonstrates the use of GPS for maintaining course and introduces the concept of bearings. Chapter 7 hones the practice of manual piloting, dead reckoning, and related topics. Chapter 8 is a review and prepares the student for the open and closed book exams. This course covers all the elements of the old Piloting course plus GPS, its use and application as well as its limitations. Very impressive. There is a possibility that we may be allowed to be a beta tester of this new course. Lets all keep our fingers crossed. It would be good for the squadron's reputation and it would give our members a head start on the new courses.

We gave the final exam in Weather last month as well as the Seamanship 101 exam. Results are pending.

Many thanks to Doris Valentine, Marilyn Schmidt, Sandy Schoonmaker, and Lt Marian Sweigert, AP, for helping with student registration. Proctors Joe Auchter, Bob Flanigan, Peter Collett, Sylvia Smith, John Lynne, P, Rick Schoonmaker, SN, and John Mulkey are also deserving of thanks.

SAFETY Report WEAR YOUR LIFE VESTS

In the news recently we heard of a water taxi in Baltimore Inner Harbor capsizing when a sudden storm made the already choppy waters more than the boat could handle. Several people lost their lives as a result, and the rest of the 25 people aboard came close to losing theirs as well. Anybody who has been aboard one of these tourist boats knows that the life preservers are stowed under seats or hanging overhead. They are never put on by the passengers, and in most cases the correct procedure to put one on isn't even demonstrated ,unlike the boat drills on cruise ships. This sad event brings home that all important message that life preservers need to be worn when the waters are rough. Once a person is in the water it is almost impossible to don a preserver. In addition to the usual type of preservers their are some new ones on the market that are comfortable to wear. There is the SoSpender (brand name) type which goes over the shoulder and sits comfortably on your chest .like a vest. There is also the newer belt packs that you wear around your waist. The vest type is inflated either by a CO2 cartridge that works automatically when you enter the water or by blowing into a small tube. The belt model has the CO2 cartridge which is pierced when you pull on a short chord. Some of these will also inflate automatically upon entering the water. The belt pack inflatable can be used for inland boating where you do not expect huge seas or dramatic weather, and where you expect help to arrive fairly quickly. The belt model is less expensive than the vest model but both are much more expensive than our traditional life vests. Next time you are in the boat store you may want to check them out, However, even if you

buy yourself and your mate one of these newer models, you should still have on board and readily available some traditional life vests in a variety of sizes for your guests. Remember when the seas get rough have everyone put on their preserver. If they complain, remind them of what happened in Baltimore Harbor.






