





We set up a display in a huge tent located next to the monstrous VAB. While there, we passed out literature, answered questions, showed a Vessel Safety Check video, and signed up a large number of people who expressed interest in taking the next Safe Boating course. Of course for Duane and me, it was old home week as both of us worked at KSC for many years prior to retirement.

For all intents and purposes the Squadron Boating course is done. The exam was Thursday, November 11 and this was a very good group. Despite the hurricanes causing us to move the class around and even cancel one night, the group stayed with us and nearly all were in attendance the last class night. We thank our lecturers and our proctors for their dedicated efforts and, in particular, John Mulkey, for taking over while Pete Schmidt is in New Zealand.

Also on Thursday, November 11 we started the new Piloting course with Fred Adame at the lectern and Rick Schoonmaker and myself as proctors/teachers. There are 7 students enrolled. We have reviewed the course and it looks very good. Besides all the fundamentals of the old Piloting course, this one introduces the use of GPS as a navigational tool and it also teaches the student how to maneuver around computerized electronic charting. It is a hands-on course with much of the work being accomplished in the classroom. I think it will prove to be a great improvement over the old Piloting course.

For our newer members we plan to offer a Seamanship course starting in January. There are quite a few of our members who have not had this course. It is a prerequisite to Piloting, Advanced Piloting, Junior Navigation and Navigation. Hopefully with the election year behind us we can get back to our education program. People seem to have had too many other things on their mind this year and education was not among them. I cannot emphasize enough the importance of education to boating and boating safety. There are any number of good things to be said for attending class and not one negative.



Blood Bank Report Lt Barbara Millner, S

If you've tried to donate blood but found you were unable to because of an iron deficiency, you may be able to correct this condition through a change in diet.

Best sources for iron include iron fortified cereals and liver (chicken, beef or pork).

Good sources of iron are lean meat, greens (turnip, mustard, collard, spinach), liverwurst, oysters, clams, prunes (prune juice), raisins, dried apricots, dried peaches, dried beans and green lima beans.

Fair sources of iron include eggs, enriched cereals, enriched bread, blackberries, strawberries, watermelon, black-eyed peas and green peas.

Vitamin C is needed by your body to help you use the iron you eat.

Safety Report P/R/C Jane Schnoor, SN

Many of our members trailer their boats to various locations. There are a few safety tips to remember when doing this.

There should be no loose articles in the boat that may fly out while you are driving, such as life preservers, buckets, fishing poles, etc.

An accident last spring was caused when a seat cushion flew out of a boat being towed by a pick-up truck. A large van following the truck and boat swerved to the left to avoid the cushion, and then to then over-corrected to the right, causing the van to overturn several times. An 11-year-old girl was killed and eight children and three adults were injured.

The driver of the pick-up truck was charged with not having his load secured and could possibly face charges on vehicular homicide. Forethought could have prevented this accident.

In another case not only did a fishing pole and reel fly out of a boat but the trawling motor fell off as well. Fortunately no cars were following and no accident ensued.

However, the owner who neither saw nor heard these items fall, had a shock when he got to his fishing locations to find these items missing.

So, let a word to the wise suffice.
