SAFETY NEWS REPORT

P/C Frank Murphy, AP, from the Titusville Squadron found the following information in the Navy League of the U.S., Aug. 2002 publication. Congress recently appropriated \$500 million to correct the prob-I em the USCG has been having with communications with boaters The program called **National Distress and Re**sponse System Modernization project will replace today's single-channel analog radios, hand plotted status charts, and spotty coverage with "state-ofthe-art" digital communications and computerized emergency locator.

A key weakness of the existing system is that CG radios can only handle one channel at a time. This means that, when a Coast Guard station uses the radio for other purposes, it can no longer monitor Channel 16 – the main emergency distress signal. The new system will automatically locate a vessel sending a distress call and provide a line of bearing, accurate within plus or minus 2 degrees from the receiving station to the vessel in distress. (This will narrow the search area to only 14 square miles at a range of 20 nautical miles.) If more than one station hears the distress message, the new system will provide multiple bearings and reduce the search area even more

The new system will also be compatible with the newest maritime radios which are mandated to have DSC, Digital Selective Calling. DSC can provide an exact location through a link with a GPS system and broadcast

Lighthouse Trivia Told by A Keeper

In the old days before light-houses were built, signal fires were lighted on tops of hills so that the local mariners, could find their way home. The first great lighthouse was built at Alexandria, Egypt by the Ptolemic kings in 280 B.C. It was 450 feet in height. This lighthouse was destroyed during an earthquake almost 1000 years later. The light was known as the Pharohs lighthouse.

The first lighthouse in North America was built on Brewster Island in Boston Harbor in 1716. This lighthouse was destroyed by both Revolutionary and British forces during the Revolutionary War This lighthouse which is called Boston Light was rebuilt in 1783.

The second lighthouse built in the United States was at the entrance to Nantucket Harbor in Massachusetts. It was a rather flimsy structure which was destroyed many time and was rebuilt many times by dedicated whalers and fishermen.

The third lighthouse in United States was Beavertail Light built in 1749. It was the entrance to Rhode Islands Narragansett Bay and like Boston Lighthouse, it was knocked out of operation during the Revolutionary War. In 1790 it was repaired and put back in Service.

The oldest lighthouse standing in the U.S. today is the Sandy Hook Lighthouse which was built in 1764 at the entrance to New York harbor. This lighthouse is located in New Jersey.

The United States has approximately 400 plus lighthouses—145 in the Northeast, 19 in the South, 82 in the West and approximately 183 on the Great Lakes. Michigan has the most lighthouses -119, plus whereas Vermont has only one.

Lighthouse Society are called Keepers. They assist in every way possible to aid in the restoration and preservation of America's lighthouses to continue researching the history of lighthouses, lightships, and related aids to navigation and to sustain a program whose purpose is to put concerned parties in touch with local restoration groups.

The First Thanksgiving in North America

The first formal celebration of Thanksgiving in North America was held by an English explorer, Martin Frobisher, who attempted to establish an English settlement on Baffin Island, after failing to discover a northern passage to the Orient in 1576. The Pilgrims of Plymouth Rock held their Thanksgiving in 1621 as a three day "thank you" celebration to the leaders of the Wampanoag Indian tribe and their families for teaching them the survival skills they needed to make it in the New World. It was their good fortune that the tradition of the Wampanoags was to treat visitors to their homes with a share of whatever food the family had, even if supplies were low. It was also an amazing stroke of luck that one of the Wampanoag, Tisquantum or Squanto, had become close friends with a British explorer, John Weymouth, and had learned the Pilgrims' language in his travels to England with Weymouth. Thanksgiving is my favorite holiday because it is universal to many cultures.

While we give thanks for our bounty, please consider helping those who have so little.


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
